Community Mental Health Centers and Directors' Contact Info	The SC DMH system includes 16 outpatient community mental health centers and 40+ satellite mental clinics based in surrounding counties of each mental health center. Each community health center is led by a director. New patients can be seen by a Mental Health Professional (MHP) the same day they contact the center (e.g., call or walk-in). The appointment includes a comprehensive mental health status assessment, financial assessment, insurance eligibility, and the development of an individual plan of care for follow-up with an appointment with a psychiatrist. G. Werber Bryan Psychiatric Hospital, Columbia, SC	The SC DMH system also includes inpatient psychiatric hospitals, such as G. Werber Bryan Psychiatric Hospital (BPH) in Columbia, SC. BPH provides inpatient psychiatric and forensic treatment and evaluation services to adults, and psychiatric and substance use disorder treatment to children and adolescents. BPH has three campuses that provide 24-hour assessment, evidence-based treatment, and evaluation of individuals experiencing a mental health disorder. BPH offers a continuum of care from acute services designed to return patients to community treatment, to longterm treatment with referral to other community resources (e.g., apartments, community care homes, or nursing homes). Patrick B. Harris Psychiatric Hospital, Anderson, SC	Another inpatient psychiatric hospital in the SC DMH system is Patrick B. Harris Psychiatric Hospital in Anderson, SC. Harris provides short-term psychaitric care for patients 18 years and older. Patients are admitted primarily from the 13 Upstate counties in SC with referral from community mental health centers. The majority of patients are civil involuntary admissions. Harris offers a continuum of care from acute services designed to return patients to community treatment, to long-term treatment with referral to other community resources (e.g., apartments, community care homes, or nursing homes). <p>Community Mental Health Professionals in Hospital Emergency Departments</p>	<p>SC DMH mental health centers offer hospitals contracting opportunities with mental health professionals (MHPs) to work onsite at hospital emergency departments with a 50/50 split (half of MPH's salary is covered by DMH and other half is covered by hospital). MHPs are master's-trained therapists who have extensive knowledge of behavioral health resources and discharge referral sources. They can also help with warm hand-offs to SC DMH health centers throughout the state. <p>Assertive Community Treatment (ACT)</p>	<p>ACT is a comprehensive approach to assessment, treatment, and rehabilitation in a community-based setting for those with serious mental illness. The SC Department of Health and Human Services is improving this crisis intervention and care coordination system, including reimbursement, allowing SC Medicaid to cover ACT when medically necessary. <p>Mobile Crisis Units</p>	<p>SC DMH provides mobile crisis to SC residents by giving them immediate access to crisis services 24 hours a day and 365 days a year. Mobile crisis teams include highly trained clinicians who also work with local mental health centers, law enforcement, and community providers to help stabilize anyone who is having a mental health crisis. <p>Free-standing Crisis Stabilization Units</p>	<p>SC DMH regulates these free-standing units, which serve to provide care to those experiencing a psychiatric emergency. CSUs can admit patients voluntarily or involuntarily and their main goal is to stabilize the person and get them back into the community. The Charleston community opened the Tri-County Crisis Stabilization Center, a 10-bed center in 2017, through a funding partnership with MUSC, Roper Saint Francis, Charleston Center, the Charleston County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, the Charleston County Sheriff's Office, the Berkeley Mental Health Center, and the Charleston-Dorchester Mental Health Center. It currently contracts with more than 28 hospital emergency departments (ED) to provide telepsychiatry consults to ED physicians for behavioral health patients in crises via a secure telehealth connection within 4 to 6 hours of a request.
